Thought from Dawn

A colleague of mine who was due to preach on the Good Samaritan, disguised himself as a homeless person and positioned himself outside the gate of the rural church where he was due to take the service. He sat on the ground, along with a dish containing a few coins, for 25 minutes as the congregation filed past him. Not one of them placed anything in his dish, spoke to him, or invited him inside the church.

He began his sermon by asking people to raise their hands if they had noticed the homeless person sitting outside the church gate that morning. Every hand was raised. He went on to ask if any of them had helped the man or spoken to him. Not a hand was to be seen...

My colleague had found a creative way of placing the congregation right inside the heart of one of Jesus' most famous parables. Hopefully the impact of this powerful lesson will remain for some time to come.

We can't respond to every need around us but when faced with such obvious need right on our doorstep, do we really have any excuse? We may not always have cash on hand to give – but kindness costs nothing. A smile or a kindly word can be beyond value to someone who is used to being ignored. We rarely see such depth of need in this parish – but people's needs are many and varied and not all of them are obvious. May we all be ready and willing to be (or continue to be) 'good neighbours' in whatever way we can. With every blessing
