local private donations as well as the PCC, we now have sufficient funds in place to authorise our chosen contractor to begin the next stage of work at St Martins which will take place between the 14th and the 18th July. An application to the Heritage Lottery has also been made, (with letters of support from the SVA and the Parish Council) to make up any shortfall and which will mean we can progress the later phases too. On Friday the 15th July, Members of SPAB (Society for Preservation of Ancient Buildings) plan to carry out lime work repairs including local flintwork rebuilding and repointing. This will include slaking lime on site using a purpose building lime kiln which will be completed during the first day of the working party.

On Saturday 16th July the learning exercises will continue but there will also be opportunities for locals and other members of the public to come to site to ask questions about the repairs being undertaken as well as about the ruin, its historic importance and how we see its future being looked after? (10am – 12.00 mid-day)

In the early autumn we intend to have another session where we will be looking to put in place more grass turfs on the repaired wall tops to help reduce the amount of water that is penetrating the flint walls and causing voids which dislodge the flint core. This will again be an opportunity for the public to attend site to help, learn and see the work.

We will give further updates as they arise.
