May has been a quiet month for the SVA as it has been all hands on deck with preparations for the Midsummer Gala on 6th July. This year's Gala will be slightly different from previous years as we will be showcasing the many and varied activities of the groups in the village. As well as displays and presentations in the marquee, there will be some groups demonstrating their activities outside as well. This promises to be an impressive collection of the activities that go on in the village, some of which you might not be aware of. The aim is to showcase these activities rather than recruit new members to the groups but if any of them catch your eye then there will be members of the groups on hand or information for you to follow up. There will also be the traditional tea tent which itself will showcase the amazing baking that goes on in Shotesham. We will also be putting on some amusements and side shows and a football event for the more active among us. Some of these amusements will have a small charge so don't forget to bring your cash. There will be a line up of classic cars as in previous years. The Gala opens at 2:00 p.m. and will end at about 4:30 p.m. but the fun does not stop there as they will be disco music, a bar and hot food in the evening starting at 6:30. All we need now is sunny weather!

Open Garden,

Jim and Jenny's garden at Brick Kiln House, Priory Lane will be open on **Sunday 4th August 10-4pm**, for the National Garden Scheme. This is the 10th year we have opened raising over £20,000 for the scheme. The NGS is the biggest donor to MacMillan Nurses as well as supporting other nursing or caring charities.

Admission is £6pp and there will be homemade tea and cakes.

Nature Conservation in Shotesham. A looming crisis?

The village conservation group has been in operation for over 25 years and many of you will have taken part in the projects at St Mary's churchyard, All Saints church hill, Stubbs Green and other sites in the village. We hope you will be aware of how effective this voluntary work has been in improving parts of the village environment. If you have walked through the magnificent meadow at Stubbs Green this month or seen the pyramidal orchids at St Mary's you will know just what I mean.

All this could be at risk simply as a result of the passing years. Along with a small group of other enthusiasts I have acted as coordinator of the group since it started in the late 1990s. Unfortunately, as we have aged, several of us, including me, have become less able to take on the manual work such as mowing rough ground or strimming or hedge cutting. As a result, we have steadily reduced the number of sites we look after and have had to call in paid help with some of the ones we still do. Other activities that we've organised over the years such as educational meetings, surveys, nest box making etc have stopped happening mainly due to lack of energy (at least on my part)!

We are grateful that the crucial final stage of each project, usually raking up, has continued to be well supported by so many enthusiastic village volunteers.

At a time when wildlife conservation is more important than ever we really want the group to survive and flourish but without some new input we are close to the point where the group is no longer viable and the only practical option will be to wind it up, in which case the sites will no longer be managed for wildlife.

So, I am sending out this letter to ask for a few new recruits to begin to help with the leadership of the group and to share in some of the physical work. This would involve quite a small amount of work and time but could revitalise the group for many more years.
